In the 40 years of knowing my mother-in-law (who died last August), it is only after she died that I have discovered that we actually shared many of the same traits and tastes. (I am going to write in the present tense, it's just easier.)

We are both not the greatest of cooks, but she really loved making bread. And her turkey soup was good. I, on the underhand, despise the kitchen. I only get excited about the decorative hand towels that I hang on the oven door.

If we both find a product that we like, we buy massive quantities of it. Hers was books, emery boards, tealight candles, fragrance air freshener refills, ballpoint pens, little wicker baskets. Kleenex. and small handled plastic storage cubes. My obsessive buying involves large quantities of Bath and Body Work soaps and hand sanitizers, toilet paper and paper towels, scissors, underwear, socks, (well, actually all clothing), camera memory cards, and greeting cards.

When I popped in to visit her last summer, the TV was tuned to a Hallmark Movie. I thought it was a mistake as my MIL never gave any indication that she was into sappy television, but she happily informed me that she shared my love of romance movies that always end the same way. We also both like the musical group Celtic Woman and share a mutual love of photography. Her forte was nature and still-lifes, while I enjoy taking photos of family and friends, nature, and birds. "Audrev - Glad Book". Her written entries (she had beautiful handwriting) began on December 17, 1991. She wrote a lot about the love she shared with my father-in-law, who died in

August of 1995. She expressed her sadness and grief years after he died. She was glad for snow and skiing, her children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren. Several times she wrote of her happiness of a fireplace on a cold winter morning. Books, coffee, and music made her heart soar. #### **ATA Truck Tonnage Index Increased 0.7% in January**

Washington, DC... American Trucking Associations' advanced seasonally adjusted (SA) For-Hire Truck Tonnage Index rose 0.7% in Janmpared with 116.2 in December.

ATA recently revised the seasonally adjusted index back five years as part of its annual revision.

"Tonnage has increased nicely in the last couple of months," said ATA Chief Economist Bob Costello. "I suspect that some of the gain is attributable to capacity coming out of the network, especially those carriers that primarily operate in the spot market and/or bought expensive used equipment in the last couple of years. This would push more freight to contract carriers, which dominate this index. It could also be that freight bottomed and is coming up a little too. So, the gain is likely a little higher demand and a little less supply. Despite the increases in December and January, tonnage is still off 1.4% from its recent high in September."

Compared with January 2022, the SA index increased 1.5%, which was the seventeenth straight vear-over-vear gain. In December, the index was up 0.9% from a year earlier. In 2022, compared with the average in 2021, tonnage was up 3.5%.

The not seasonally adjusted index, which represents the change in tonnage actually hauled by the fleets before any seasonal adjustment, equaled 112.7 in January, 0.4% below the December level (113.2). In calculating the index, 100 represents 2015. ATA's For-Hire Truck Tonnage Index is dominated by contract freight as opposed to spot market freight.

Trucking serves as a barometer of the U.S. economy, representing 72.2% of tonnage carried by all modes of domestic freight transportation, including manufactured and retail goods. Trucks hauled 10.93 billion tons of freight in 2021. Motor carriers collected \$875.5 billion, or 80.8% of total revenue earned by all transport modes.

ATA calculates the tonnage index based on surveys from its membership and has been doing so since the 1970s. This is a preliminary figure and subject to change in the final report issued around the 5th day of each month. The report includes month-tomonth and year-over-year results, relevant economic comparisons, and key financial indicators.

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#### Repeal Heavy-Duty Excise Tax and Get Cleaner Trucks on Our Roads, **Transportation Groups Urge Congress**

Washington, DC... A group of transportation and trucking stakeholders is calling on Congress to repeal the Federal Excise Tax (FET) on heavy-duty commercial vehicles. This century-old tax is impeding the deployment of cleaner, more environmentally friendly trucks on our nation's roads, according to a letter from the American Trucking Associations, American Truck Dealers, and Zero Emission Transportation Association sent Congressional leadership.

The heavy-duty excise tax was established in 1917 to defray the costs of World War I and today adds 12% to the cost of a new truck, creating a major disincentive for trucking fleets small and large to modernize their equipment and replace older tractors with new, low-emission power units. The FET can add more than \$50,000 to the price of the latest lowor zero-emission vehicle, making these investments cost-prohibitive for smaller fleets. Over 90% of U.S. motor carriers operate six or fewer trucks.

"If Congress is serious about safety, the environment and jobs, then repealing the FET should be front-burner," said ATA President and CEO Chris Spear. "It's time to shelve

and starting putting the best equipment on our roads."

"The federal government wants heavy-duty trucks to be cleaner or emission free, but slaps a 12 percent tax on the newest, greenest trucks. If the goal is to reduce emissions, repealing the counterproductive FET is a good place to start," said Scott Mc-Candless, ATD Chairman and President of McCandless Truck Center LLC of Aurora, Colo.

"The federal excise tax harms American truckers and fleet operators by inflating the cost of heavy-duty trucks and limiting access to the many economic and public health benefits that come with transportation electrification," said Albert Gore, executive director at ZETA. "Medium and heavy-duty trucks account for 24% of all transportation carbon emissions in the United States but represent only 4% of vehicles on the road. It is time to accelerate our movement towards modernized transportation fleets, and we must enable our nation's fleet operators and truckers to join in this effort."

In the 117th Congress, U.S. Senators Todd Young (R-Ind.) and Ben Cardin (D-Md.), and Representatives Doug LaMalfa (R-Calif.)

this World War I era tax and Chris Pappas (D-N.H.) introduced the Modern, Clean, and Safe Trucks Act (H.R. 8116/S. 2435), bipartisan and bicameral legislation to repeal the tax.











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
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## High Performance Diesels with Bruce Mallinson

#### The Importance Of Aftertreatment

Heavy-duty trucks play a vital role in our everyday lives. These trucks are designed to carry large payloads and travel long distances, making them an essential component of the transportation sector. However, these trucks also significantly impact the environment due to their emissions. As a result, the

development of aftertreatment systems has become increasingly important for modern class 8 trucks to reduce their environmental impact.

An aftertreatment system is essential to a modern truck's exhaust system. It is designed to reduce harmful emissions that are produced during the combustion process. These emissions include nitrogen oxides (NOx), particulate matter (PM), and carbon monoxide (CO), which can have a detrimental impact on the environment and human health. Aftertreatment systems use various technologies to remove these harmful emissions from the exhaust stream into the atmosphere.

One of the primary benefits of aftertreatment systems for class 8 trucks is that they help to reduce harmful emissions. These emissions significantly contribute to air pollution and have been linked to various health problems, including respiratory diseases and cancer. By reducing emissions, aftertreatment systems help to create cleaner and healthier air for people to breathe.

One of the most common technologies used in aftertreatment systems is the diesel particulate filter (DPF). The DPF is designed to capture and remove particulate matter from the exhaust stream. It uses a ceramic filter that traps soot particles as they pass through the exhaust system. The trapped particles are then burned off during a process known as regeneration, which converts the soot into ash and releases it from the filter. This process helps to reduce the amount of particulate matter released into the atmosphere.

Another technology used in aftertreatment systems is the selective catalytic reduction (SCR) system. The SCR system uses a catalyst to convert nitrogen oxides (NOx)

into harmless nitrogen and water. The system injects a urea-based solution, known as diesel exhaust fluid (DEF), into the exhaust stream. The DEF reacts with the NOx in the presence of the catalyst, breaking it down into nitrogen and water. This process helps to reduce the amount of NOx released into the atmosphere.

In addition to reducing emissions, aftertreatment systems can improve the fuel efficiency of Class 8 trucking rigs when used correctly and regularly maintained in conjunction with the OEM's maintenance intervals. By reducing the amount of work

before they are released required by the engine to overcome the resistance of the aftertreatment system, the engine can operate more efficiently, resulting in lower fuel consumption. This reduces the cost of operating the truck and the number of greenhouse gases emitted during operation.

> Another benefit of aftertreatment systems for class 8 trucking is that they help to comply with emissions regulations. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has established strict emissions regulations for heavy-duty trucks to reduce their environmental impact. Aftertreatment systems are essential to meeting these regulations, as they help reduce emissions and ensure compliance with the EPA's standards.

#### **Heavy-Duty** Repair Revenues Recover to **Pre-Pandemic** Levels **According to New Report**

Orlando, FL... Heavy-duty repair shop revenue appears to be climbing back pre-pandemic form 2022, according to the third annual State of Heavy-Duty Repair report issued by Fullbay, in partnership with ATA's Technology & Maintenance Council.

"This year's report provides repair shops with essential insights and best practices to run their business," said Fullbay CEO Patrick McKittrick. "The report offers commercial repair data you can't find anywhere else with learnings on shop management, labor challenges and other current industry issues. It's all designed to provide shops with a tool to benchmark their business."

Among the key findings of this year's report:

\* 76% of shops raised their labor rates in 2022, 24% did not.

\* 25% of shops surveyed were pulling in between \$1 to \$2 million each year, while 17% reported revenue between \$250,001 and \$500,000.

\* 19.8% of shops reported having a better handle on their P&L, as compared to only 9.8% last

"At TMC, we have been helping industry professionals improve maintenance and maintenance management for decades, and this report is an excellent way to better accomplish that goal," said TMC **Executive Director Robert** Braswell. "Facing obstacles isn't new for repair shops; our recommended practices, which are included throughout the report, offer proper assistance for repair shops looking for guidance dealing with these challenges."

The report's data is based on survey responses from more than 1600 individuals from shops in North America, Australia and New Zealand, across all avenues of the commercial freight, logistics, and repair industries. In addition, more than 500 businesses across North America using the Fullbay platform were sampled for real-world shop data. Results were anonymized and those surveyed included both customers of Fullbay and non-customers.

OKLAHOMA OK... Loves Travel Stops recently awarded 140 Gemini Motor Transport drivers more than \$2.3 million in bonuses for their commitment to safety last year. Gemini, a member of the Loves Family of Companies, operates a fleet of more than 1,600 drivers who transport fuel to Love's Travel Stops across the country.

"The safety of our drivers and those on the roadways around us is our top priority and rewarding drivers for maintaining Gemini's high standard of safety is exciting to see," said Jeremy Gravely, director of Gemini. "The Safe Drivers Program is an investment that's unmatched in the industry, and one that's crucial to the success of Gemini and Love's Travel Stops."

Bonuses are based on safety credits awarded to drivers on an annual basis. To earn one credit, drivers

CITY, must remain accident- and ticket-free and have no fuel-related incidents over the course of one year. Drivers must also pass all U.S. Department of Transportation and Gemini inspections and adhere to Geminis stringent safety policies. Once drivers collect five safety credits, they re eligible to receive the bonus.

Bonuses are given on a five and 10-year basis. This year, 96 recipients received a five-year bonus, and 44 recipients received a 10year bonus. Gemini drivers have been paid more than \$24 million in safety bonuses through the safety credit program.

#### **ATA Warns Congress Against** Drivers \$2.3 Million In Allowing California to Set National **Emissions Rules**

WASHINGTON, American Trucking Associations President and CEO Chris Spear recently told Congress that the industry needed realistic national timelines and targets to reduce emissions, rather than allowing California and other states to drive standards.

"The trucking industry starts with 'yes,' Spear testified before the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee today. "ATA worked with the Environmental Protection Agency, producing Phases I and II emission reduction rules, as well as the SmartWay Transport Partnership which has been a model of public-private cooperation. To date, 98.5% of all emissions have been removed from our tailpipes. In fact, 60 trucks today emit what one truck emitted in 1988." Spear emphasized that

those gains, which include reductions of millions of tons of carbon, nitrogen oxide and particulate matter emissions, were the result of collaborative regulatory processes and realistic goals.

"This is not a debate about if we get to zero, but when. - we'll get there, just not on the timelines proposed by California. By excluding our industry in a mad dash to zero makes their timeline and targets not only unachievable... but guarantees they will fail," Spear said. "To get to zero, we must be honest and transparent about the road ahead. Sourcing rare minerals needed for millions of 5,000 pounds of truck batteries, the infrastructure needed to charge them and the additional electricity needed to power our trucks - full scale - doesn't vet exist... and won't if you allow California to set the nation's standard.'

If California's proposals are allowed to set targets and timelines for emissions reductions, Spear said it

will certainly impact the industry and the supply chain and Americans will feel those disruptions.

"Over the next decade, trucks will be tasked with moving 2.4 billion more tons of freight than they do today - the moment that slows or stops, Americans, your constituents, will want answers," he said. "The responsible approach is also the realistic approach. Achievable timelines and targets matter. We're committed to a cleaner environment - we've proven that. We simply ask that we be realistic about the path forward. Do that, and we'll post the best environmental gains possible."

#### **ATA Hails** Revised **FHWA Priorities** Memo

Washington, DC... The Trucking American Associations said a revised memo outlining the Federal Highway Administration's priorities for use of funds from the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act will reduce confusion and accelerate important investments in improving freight capacity.

In 2021, FHWA issued a memo outlining a wish list of priorities for states as they spent IIJA funds priorities that ran counter to the bipartisan bill's intent by directing funds to highway maintenance and non-highway projects over investments in expanding highway capacity.

Chris Spear told the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee on February 1 that the effect of the memo was the country would have "really nice roads and bridges, but we're still sitting on them going nowhere. We need truck lanes we need parking we need new bridges. We need more capacity to move the freight.

FHWA's new memo brings the agency's guidance in line with IIJA's language and clarifies that states can invest in critical freight capacity expansion projects.

"We are pleased that thanks to congressional leadership - notably House Transportation and Infrastructure Chairman Sam Graves and Senator Shelley Moore Capito, ranking member of the Senate Environment and Public Works Committee - FHWA recognized their mistake and changed course," Spear said. "We look forward to continuing to work with FHWA and Congress to make sure this historic investment goes to where it can do the most good for our country and economy."



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## Fischer Pushes Back Against Federal Outreach - We Have an Obligation to Stand Up and Push Back Against Out-of-Touch, Far-Left Policies"

WASHINGTON, DC... U.S. Senator Deb Fischer (R-Neb.) recetnly delivered a speech on the Senate floor highlighting the Biden administration's obsession with unhelpful and unnecessary regulations.

During her remarks, Sen. Fischer also discussed her legislation to overturn a burdensome EPA regulation on the trucking industry, as well as other measures she is supporting to push back against out-of-touch policies.

Following is a transcript of Senator Fischer's remarks as prepared for delivery:

M. President,

My colleagues are here today to shine a light on the Biden administration's obsession with unhelpful and unnecessary regulations.

We know that excessive red tape devastates our economy and harms communities. That's why the President's woke agenda needs to be stopped — and we can do that here in the Senate.

I've introduced legislation this Congress to push back against the administration's misguided rule intensifying emissions standards for heavy duty vehicles

In my home state of Nebraska, one in 12 people are employed by the truck-

ing industry — making it the third largest industry in our state.

In the United States as a whole, over three million people work as commercial truckers, and American truckers transported almost 11 billion tons of freight in the year 2021

Consumers all across the country rely on trucking to bring goods to markets quickly and affordably.

Truckers play an essential role in our communities and economy — but the Biden administration doesn't seem to agree with that fact. Instead, our president routinely chooses to prioritize excessive environmental regulations over people's livelihoods.

Nowhere is this clearer than in the Environmental Protection Agency's recent rule establishing stricter emissions standards for heavy-duty vehicles.

The Biden administration wants to saddle hardworking drivers with an onerous regulation that will increase vehicle costs and deal a serious blow to good-paying jobs.

This aggressive EPA rule will hit mom-and-pop truck operations the hardest — for trucks to be compliant with the new overregulation, it will be cost-prohibitive for small business

wners.

Don't get me wrong — Nebraskans, over a quarter of whom work jobs related to agriculture, care deeply about environmental stewardship. But the EPA's emissions rule wouldn't actually accomplish its stated purpose of cleaning up our climate.

The EPA itself estimates that the technology required to meet this new rule's standards will cost between approximately \$2,500 and \$8,500 per vehicle.

This means that many truckers will choose to keep their old heavy-duty vehicles, which have higher rates of emissions, instead of buying vehicles that are both affordable and more climate-conscious.

During a period of high inflation and supply chain disruptions, the last thing this country needs is more expensive freight costs and fewer truckers.

Congress needs to vote to overturn this excessive rule — one that will hurt both the transportation sector and consumers at large.

The bottom line is that we have an obligation to stand up and push back against out-of-touch, far-left policies. I appreciate the work so many of my colleagues are doing toward this goal.

Senator Braun is leading the charge to overturn the president's new environmental, social, and corporate governance rule on retirement funds. The Biden administration shouldn't be playing games with Americans' hard-earned money like this.

My friend Senator Tuberville is pushing back on the administration's Veterans Affairs rule that would funnel taxpayer dollars toward abortions.

And, as Senator Capito shared earlier, she is leading us in resisting the Obama-era WOTUS rule implemented late last year.

The WOTUS rule — which I've been fighting since my first term in the Senate — is the federal government at its worst: it encroaches on families, communities, and businesses by its brazen intrusion into states' precious water resource.

The Biden administration has a track record of prioritizing politically-charged regulations over the financial and economic wellbeing of Americans. My colleagues and I are here to stop these rules before they damage the livelihoods of Nebraskans and others across the country.

As long as I have the honor of working in the Senate, I'll continue to oppose radical, far-left rules and promote common-sense solutions instead. My colleagues on both sides of the aisle should join me.

#### OOIDA Sends Letter To The Senate's HELP Committee Leadership

Dear Chairman Sanders and Ranking Member Cassidy:

The Owner-Operator Independent Drivers Association represents 150,000 owner-operators leased to motor carriers, small-business motor carriers with their own operating authority, and employee truck drivers. We oppose Ms. Julie Su's nomination to lead the Department of Labor and the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor. & Pensions must reject her nomination in order to protect the livelihoods and careers of the hard-working truckers we represent. Her record as California Labor Commissioner and Secretary for the California Labor and Workforce Development Agency, including her support for AB5 and overseeing its disastrous implementation, demonstrates she would pursue policies that threaten our members' ability to use a business model they have properly and beneficially used for decades.

AB5 in California, which implements the ABC Test to classify workers, essentially requires that an owner-operator working with a carrier through a lease


agreement must be classified as an employee. This is contrary to decades of practice as well as federal laws and regulations that allow for owner-operators to be independent contractors. This is the most disruptive worker classification policy to be enacted anywhere at the state or federal level.

When asked about AB5 in an interview, Ms. Su responded that it was meant to address misclassification that has "resulted in the day labor-ization of our economy." She continued, "Instead of the steady, consistent, reliable work, people end up basically in odd jobs and you're hustling all the time, right? So AB 5 is meant to address that kind of misclassification so that we can bring more people who should be under the protection of our labor laws back on that floor."

These comments demonstrate either an ignorance of the owner-operator model in trucking or an overly broad generalization of how different workers operate as independent contractors. For the tens of thousands of truckers who have enjoyed a successful career as an owner-operator, it would come as a surprise to learn that their business represents an "odd job" in need of fixing.

It has been frustrating enough for small-business

truckers that the California legislature ignored their concerns when enacting AB5. But the implementation of the law has been just as, if not more, disappointing. For months after the law was enacted, OOI-DA sought guidance about how the law would apply in the trucking industry and how small businesses and independent contractors could potentially comply. Despite our efforts, we were left with essentially no guidance before the law took effect. The law and its haphazard rollout has forced independent contractor truckers to leave the state of California, become an employee, attempt to reconfigure their business, operate under a cloud of uncertainty, or abandon the trucking profession altogether.

For these reasons, we are concerned that Ms. Su would continue to pursue an ideologically-motivated agenda towards worker classification that ignores the thousands of small-business truckers that depend on the ability to work as an independent contractor. Make no mistake, if Ms. Su were to advance the same policies that she championed in California, it would force hundreds of thousands of truckers to change their business model and put their livelihood in jeopardy. We are especially concerned with her nomination at a time when the Department of Labor is working on an updated worker classification rule. There is the potential

for this rule to make some improvements to worker classification at the federal level, but if Ms. Su is confirmed to lead the Department, we fear that we will see a repeat of what's happened in California.

Our association is in a unique position to offer an important perspective on labor issues because we are the only trade association dedicated to representing the interests of truckers who make their living out on the road. Unfortunately, these views have been left out of discussions involving worker classification. There is certainly misclassification in trucking, but there is no one-size-fits-all solution to address the problem. We have seen proposals that would implement a much too broad definition of employee and force owner-operators to work as employees, as well as proposals that would allow motor carriers to exert greater control over owner-operators while avoiding scrutiny on the classification issue.

We stand ready to work with Senators to address misclassification and improve working conditions in the trucking industry. But we believe that Ms. Su's confirmation would make it extremely difficult to fix these issues in a way that benefits America's truckers.



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

#### **ATA Voices Support for** Bipartisan, **Bicameral** Effort to Repeal Truck **Excise Tax**

Washington, DC... The American Trucking Associations is hailing congressional leaders for their efforts to repeal the antiquated federal excise tax on the purchase of new trucks.


"The federal excise tax on purchases of trucks adds nearly \$25,000 to the cost of new equipment - slowing deployment of safer and more environmentally friendly vehicles," said ATA President and CEO Chris Spear. "This more than 100-year-old tax first instituted to support American troops during the First World War, has far outlived its usefulness and now acts as an impediment to creating jobs, reducing emissions and improving highway safety."

The Modern Clean and Safe Trucks Act of 2023 was introduced in both the House and Senate by a bipartisan coalition of Congressmen and Senators, led by Reps. Doug LaMalfa, Chris Pappas, Earl Blumenauer and Darin LaHood in the House and Sens. Ben Cardin and Todd Young in the Senate. The FET is currently the highest percentage excise tax - at 12 percent - levied on any product.



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#### **International Roadcheck Is May 16-18 with Emphasis on ABS and Cargo Securement**

Washington, DC... The Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance (CVSA) has announced May 16-18 as this year's International Roadcheck. International Roadcheck is a high-visibility, high-volume 72-hour inspection and enforcement event where CVSA-certified inspectors in Canada, Mexico and the U.S. will conduct inspections of commercial motor vehicles and drivers at weigh/ inspection stations, designated inspection areas and along roadways.

This year, inspectors will focus on anti-lock braking systems (ABS) and cargo securement to highlight the importance of those aspects of vehicle safety. Although ABS violations are not out-of-service violations, ABS play a critical role in reducing the risk of collisions by preventing the wheels from locking up or skidding, allowing a driver to maintain control of the vehicle while braking. In addition, improper cargo securement poses a serious risk to drivers and other motorists by adversely affecting the vehicle's maneuverability, or worse, causing unsecured loads to fall, resulting in traffic hazards and vehicle collisions.

During International Roadcheck, inspectors will conduct their usual roadside safety inspections of commercial motor vehicles and drivers. Data will be gathered from those three days and shared later this year, as a snapshot of the state of commercial motor vehicle and driver safety.

International Roadcheck also provides an opportunity to educate the motor carrier industry and general public about the importance of safe commercial motor vehicle operations and the North American Standard Inspection Program.

During a routine North American Standard Level I Inspection, inspectors focus on two areas driver and vehicle safety compliance.

\* Vehicle safety – Inspectors will ensure the vehicle's brake systems, cargo securement, coupling devices, driveline/driveshaft components, driver's seat, fuel and exhaust systems, frames, lighting devices, steering mechanisms, suspensions, tires, wheels, rims, hubs and windshield wipers are compliant with regulations. Inspections of motorcoaches, passenger vans and other passenger-carrying vehicles also include emergency exits, seating, and electrical cables and systems in the engine and battery compartments.

\* Driver safety - Inspec-

tors will check the driver's operating credentials, hours-of-service documentation, status in the drug and alcohol clearinghouse, seat belt usage, and for alcohol and/or drug impair-

Vehicles that successful-

ly pass a Level I or Level V Inspection without any critical vehicle inspection item violations may receive a CVSA decal, which is valid for three months. If the inspector does identify critical vehicle inspection item violations, as outlined

in the North American Standard Out-of-Service Criteria, the vehicle will be restricted from operating until the identified out-ofservice conditions have been corrected. Inspectors may also restrict the driver from operating if the driver is found to have driver outof-service violations, such as not possessing a valid or necessary operating license or exhibiting signs of impairment.

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

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

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#### Something to Think About -Some Things Don't Change

"How have changed since you were a child?" Area seniors were asked to respond to this prompt by a local agency on aging. The agency wanted to create contacts with the senior community, and at the same time learn a little about them. If they requested, students from a local college writing class would meet interested individuals at the college library and record their reflections for them. In addition to being in touch with local seniors, the agency hoped that looking at the differences the seniors have or are noticing might give some indications of services and programs the agency could provide. Nobody was going to become a Nobel Laureate with this research, but it would be interesting and potentially insightful for the agency, while being fun for those who chose to participate.

In the end, there were more than 200 responses, about a third of which were written and submitted directly by seniors. The agency didn't request any identifying information, just an age, and even that was optional. All but a limited few agreed to provide their age. In discuss-

ing the differences they've into my life. I've learned observed, the respondents hit a wide range of topics. They touched on clothing and grooming styles, music and entertainment, politics and government, lifestyle, technology, religion, and a host of other topics where they saw noticeable change. There was however, one response, written out in longhand, that on first read, didn't seem to address the prompt. After a careful read, that response was a true testament to the person who wrote it. Here it is, just as it was offered.

Oh, there's lots of differences I've noticed over my years. But I suspect most of them are more the result of how my perspectives has changed. If you fight change, change generally wins in the end, so long ago I learned how to adapt and make the most of it. There's several things that haven't changed, at least for me, and holding onto them has made adapting much easier. Here's a few of them.

A lot of the people I loved as a kid, I love even more now, because we've been though decades together. We've laughed a lot, cried a little, and did what we did day by day to live out our lives. Lots of new people have come that there's really no limit on how many people you can love or how much you can love them; that's all up to you. Some of the folks who were big players in my childhood are gone. Because I've come to realize how much more fully, they did for me, I respect them and love them more. Love is the real thing, it's the big deal, always has been always will be!

There are eight other similarities that easily come to mind.

1. The harder I've worked the greater the rewards of my efforts, but no reward has ever seemed sufficient if I'm not enjoying life.

2. Curiosity maybe killed the cat, but it's still the spark that starts the fire of my imagination, lights the lamp of my learning, and ignites the engine of my motivation




Throughout the last century, more than 1.3 million trucks have hauled goods across the United States and Canada roadways with the Kenworth badge on the grill. In 2023, Kenworth begins a year-long celebration, commemorating its 100th anniversary and contributions to the transportation industry.

The history of Kenworth began in 1923 when Harry W. Kent and Edgar K. Worthington incorporated the Gersix Motor Company as Kenworth. The company name was formed from a combination of letters from the founders' last names while the world-renown Kenworth "bug" logo originated from the K in Kent and W in Worthing-

ton

That first year, the small Seattle truck manufacturer produced 78 six-cylinder, gasoline-powered trucks. Since then, Kenworth has produced more than a million Class 5 to Class 8 models, and super heavy duty trucks, like the C500 6x6 with its gross combination weight rating of 1 million pounds. Kenworth is also now producing medium and heavy duty battery electric vehicles.

"Kenworth's storied history over the past 100 years provides much to be proud about. From being the first U.S. truck manufacturer to offer a diesel engine as standard equipment in 1933 to selling Kenworth trucks

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



#### A Likely Story - The Night Shift

It was a cold April night in the countryside outside El Paso, and drivers were just settling in the TV room when word came down from dispatch. Five trucks were immediately needed to bobtail for Dallas, scheduled to arrive first thing in the morning. Taking a few minutes to grab some snacks, top off the fuel tanks, and empty the ashtrays, we headed out with our bright red T600's.

Chatter on the CB was heavy that night, but everyone was in cheery spirits, and that always makes the night a lot less formidable. Eventually, however, the trip turned quiet as the evening wore on. Still we motored on, our minds and hearts on the same wavelength as cruise control.

Somewhere in the hills above Van Horn, deep in the 3:00 AM hour, we were running about a half mile apart from each other, when we were passed by

a white KW T600. I was running back door that night, and barely even noticed it. Neither did the three trucks ahead of me.

By the time the interloper passed the next red racer, they were both beyond my line of sight. Then suddenly the silence of the night was broken by the CB voice of our front door, who exclaimed, "If I didn't just get passed by a white T600, I'm throwing out this whole bottle of pills!"

I was once one of three drivers assigned to loads of candy going from Memphis to City Of Industry, a Angeles Los suburb. instructions were somewhat cryptic. Arrive at 4:00 AM, speak only to Dennis, and pay what he asks for. We didn't even have a last name, which struck me as odd, but even crazier was the order to show up with seven hundred dollars, each.

Sure enough, as we turned into the gate, Dennis was there to greet us, and he very pleasantly asked for \$700. Although it was a breathtaking amount, even for a California lumper, I readily handed it over. So did the driver behind me. But then things got bizarre.

The third driver balked, claiming it was a rip off, and refused to pay the lumper fee. Dennis informed the driver that he didn't have to pay but would be required to unload his trailer without help. Oh, and by


the way, Dennis said, the load is 7,500 pieces, and it could stretch out to several hours

At 7:00 AM, following a brief nap, two of us were empty and headed for the street. One of us wasn't. Two of us went to LAX and loaded car parts for Tennessee. One of us didn't. Two of us passed the candy warehouse on the way back to Memphis, and one of us was still backed into the dock. He may still be there, for all I know.

My best friend in all the world turns 190 this summer but comes alive in the night. He sees more in the dark than most of us notice

in the daylight. But it really has affected his brain because he still listens. He still forgives. He still prays, and still does a thorough pre-trip inspection.

This was particularly evident when we ran team together. I could rest easy every night, knowing he would be wide awake enough to tell me that he passed 132 trains, 16 wind farms, and 4 classic cars between midnight and 0600. He lived on a thermos of coffee and half-packet of Oreo cookies, most nights, and thirty years later remembers every load we ever hauled.

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




