BROADVIEW HEIGHTS, OH-Ohio Peterbilt's legacy is deeply rooted in Ohio, tracing back to 1945 when Tom Taylor founded the Ohio Machinery Company in Columbus. Now, under the leadership of his grandson, Ken Taylor, who became President in 1994, the company has grown significantly.

Originally a Caterpillar Heavy Equipment and CAT Engine Dealer, the Ohio Machinery Company


has expanded into six subsidiaries, employing 1,624 people across Ohio. These subsidiaries include Ohio CAT, Ohio Peterbilt, Complete Diesel, Complete Bus and Specialty Vehicles, and Complete Hydraulic Component Service. Ohio Machinery acquired all Caterpillar dealers in the state through strategic acquisitions and controlled growth.

When Caterpillar exited the on-road engine market, Ohio CAT sought to continue serving their commer-

cial vehicle customers, leading to the establishment of a network of Peterbilt truck dealerships. In 2018, they purchased four dealerships from All State Peterbilt, and in 2020, they purchased three more from AMG Peterbilt. Today, Ohio Peterbilt offers exceptional service with 10 locations statewide in Cleveland, Canton, Columbus, Findlay, Grove City, Lima, Marietta, Toledo, Youngstown, and Zanesville. Addi-





The Importance of Radiator **Maintenance in Class 8 Vehicles**

Class 8 vehicles are an essential component of global supply chains. The efficient operation of these massive vehicles not only ensures the timely delivery of goods but also significantly impacts the bottom line of transport companies and Owner-Operators. tenance prevents vehicle installed a high-efficiency radiator. This new one is much better than the original. It has 420 dimpled cooling tubes instead of the 320 in the stock version, and it features 19 fins per square inch, compared to the Stock's 14-16 fins per square inch. These improvements mean it cools the engine more effectively, helping the vehicle run better and last longer.

How Do Radiators Work?



A radiator is a critical component of a vehicle's cooling system. It helps regulate the engine's temperature by transferring heat from the coolant fluid inside it to the air outside, thereby preventing the engine from overheating. The radiator consists of a series of thin tubes with fins that dissipate the heat, supported by fans that enhance the cooling effect. This continuous cycle of cooling down the heated coolant fluid and recirculating it back keeps the engine running at a safe operating temperature.



The Importance of Radiator Maintenance

1. Prevents Engine Overheating: Class 8 vehicles are subjected to prolonged periods of operation and are often driven in harsh conditions. Given the volume of fuel heavy-duty trucks consume, even a minor improvement in efficiency can lead to substantial cost savings.
- 3. Prolongs Engine Life: Consistently managing the engine's temperature reduces wear and tear. Regular maintenance of the radiator can significantly extend the lifespan of the engine, saving on costly repairs and replacements.
- 4. Reduces Downtime: Fleet managers aim to maximize vehicle uptime. Radiator failures can lead to unexpected breakdowns, causing delays and increasing operational costs. Routine radiator checks and maintenance can minimize these risks, ensuring that vehicles remain road-ready.

- 5. Thermostat and Fan Check: Ensure the thermostat and cooling fans are functioning correctly. The thermostat regulates the coolant flow based on the engine temperature, while the fans aid in dissipating



ATA Truck Tonnage Index Jumped 3.6% in May

Washington, DC... American Trucking Associations' advanced seasonally adjusted For-Hire Truck Tonnage Index increased 3.6% in May after decreasing 1% in April. In May, the index equaled 115.9 (2015=100) compared with 111.9 in April.

"May was the first month since February 2023 that tonnage increased both sequentially and from a year earlier," said ATA Chief Economist Bob Costello. "While there was clearly an increase in freight before the Memorial Day holiday, it is still too early to say whether this is the start of a long-awaited recovery in the truck freight market."

April's decrease was revised up slightly from our May 21 press release.

Compared with May 2023, the index rose 1.5%, the first year-over-year gain in fifteen months. In April, the index was down 1.3% from a year earlier.

The not seasonally adjusted index, which represents the change in tonnage actually hauled by the fleets before any seasonal adjustment, equaled 120.4 in May, 7.1% above April. ATA's For-Hire Truck Tonnage Index is dominated by contract freight as opposed to spot market freight.

In calculating the index, 100 represents 2015.

Trucking serves as a barometer of the U.S. economy, representing 72.6% of tonnage carried by all modes of domestic freight transportation, including manufactured and retail goods. Trucks hauled 11.46 billion tons of freight in 2022. Motor carriers collected \$940.8 billion, or 80.7% of total revenue earned by all transport modes.

ATA calculates the tonnage index based on surveys from its membership and has been doing so since the 1970s. This is a preliminary figure and subject to change in the final report issued around the 5th day of each month. The report includes month-to-month and year-over-year results, relevant economic comparisons, and key financial indicators.

CVSA Releases 2024 Human Trafficking Awareness Initiative Results

Earlier this year, commercial motor vehicle law enforcement personnel and industry and association professionals from Canada, Mexico and the U.S. participated in this year's Human Trafficking Awareness Initiative (HTAI).

The Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance (CVSA) invited its law enforcement and industry/association members to participate in an annual five-day human trafficking awareness and outreach campaign. Participating enforcement and industry members took that opportunity to raise awareness and train individuals on the crime of human trafficking, indicators to look for and what to do when a victim of human trafficking has been identified.

Participating members submitted reports to CVSA about their activities leading up to and during the initiative. Fifty-one jurisdictions took part in this year's HTAI.

Examples of law enforce-

ment's activities include:

* Handed out human trafficking information to drivers to review during the portion of an inspection when the driver is waiting

* Observed and spoke with passengers in trucks to monitor for signs of human trafficking

* Distributed flyers and wallet cards and talked to the public at truck stops, city halls, train and bus stations, ports of entry, department of motor vehicle offices, weigh/inspection stations, etc.

* Displayed the human trafficking hotline on digital roadway billboards

* Posted messages, videos, infographics, etc., to social media

* Included brief information about human trafficking and a hyperlink to more information in new entrant and compliance review emails

* Delivered human trafficking awareness and prevention training to motor carriers * Issued news releases, held news conferences, and spoke with reporters for print and television news segments

* Completed the human trafficking online learning modules

*In the U.S., participated in Wear Blue Day on Jan. 11 (#WearBlueDay)

For HTAI, CVSA collaborated with TAT (formerly known as Truckers Against Trafficking) to offer human trafficking identification and prevention training and reference materials to the motor carrier industry and law enforcement.

This year, 38,158 wallet cards, 13,510 window decals and 1,603 posters were distributed. There were 334 human trafficking outreach events, and 204 presentations were delivered. In addition, 692 media contacts were made and there were 107 reported social media posts.

In addition, CVSA worked with the Paramount/CBS network to

create public service announcement (PSA) videos, which feature a human trafficking survivor, truck driver and commercial vehicle enforcement officer. The PSAs are available for public use and distribution as a 30-second video and an extended five-minute video. The PSAs aired during commercial breaks of streaming television shows and movies on Pluto TV, Paramount+ and local streaming service EYEQ Local. Combined, those PSAs yielded 15,652,611 impressions.

From Nov. 15, 2023, the day this year's HTAI was announced, to the end of March, which was the month of Mexico's HTAI, CVSA's website saw 20,552 views on its Human Trafficking Prevention Program webpages.

CVSA's Human Trafficking Prevention Program seeks to eliminate the crime of human trafficking through coordinated enforcement and investigations and educational awareness.


This year's show took place on May 3-4, and fea-

Report Released From I-95 Bridge Crash Says Truck Was Unsecured

The 2023 crash shut down the Philadelphia highway and created major supply chain

According to new details from a federal investigation, an open cover on a gas tank may have caused the fire that led to the I-95 bridge collapse in Philadelphia.

On June 11, 2023 a truck

hauling gasoline crashed into the I-95 overpass and overturned causing a fire and explosion that killed the driver and closed the bridge for several weeks.

A report from the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) says that the fire "most likely originated when gasoline escaped from an open 16-inch manhole ... of

the trailer as it overturned, and the 2,499 gallons of gasoline/ethanol mixture contained in the compartment began to spill out of the tank and ignite.'

Video evidence obtained by investigators shows the 16-inch "manhole" was open when driver Nathan Moody arrived at the Buckeye Terminal in Wilmington, Delaware

to refill the tank. The video shows the cover was not properly secured when he drove away to deliver it to a Wawa on Oxford Avenue in Northeast Philadelphia, about 42 miles away.

A "origin and cause" report by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives was issued in September 2023 but was not

made public until June 12, 2024. This was included in a set of investigative materials released by the NTSB. The final report is expected to be

released in about a year.

A NTSB "human performance" report said the truck rolled over as it negotiated an off-ramp at what appeared in surveillance video from a nearby building to be a high rate of speed.

The ATF said it is also possible the aluminum tank ruptured or vapor recovery elements were damaged, releasing gasoline or vapors, or that the vehicle's diesel gas tanks ruptured, or a combination of factors.

Moody's cousin, Isaac Moody, a truck driver himself, said he was unaware of the tanker manhole cover issue but knew Nathan to be a safety-conscious driver who stayed up on regulations and training requirements.

"It's so easy for them to throw the blame on the trucker in almost every accident that happens," Isaac Moody said in a phone interview with Transport Topics. "As soon as a trucker cannot defend themselves, they find all kinds of stuff."

An NTSB interview with Philadelphia Battalion Chief Theodore Quedenfeld said that early on, firefighters faced "a lot of fire coming out of the storm sewers from the runoff" and that eventually multiple manhole covers from storm sewers became projectiles, flying into the air from the pressure of exploding gasoline.

At one point, firefighters had to shut down their lines because they could not say for sure whether any of the storm sewers were feeding branches that would go toward a water treatment plant.

There were "dozens, dozens" of explosions, he said.

"It seemed like you would get an explosion and then it would kind of snuff itself out, but the heat would, you know, cause it to reignite as soon as it got a little oxygen," Quedenfeld told the NTSB.

Philadelphia Fire Capt. Cary Boyd told the NTSB when his team first arrived on the scene "every square foot of that underpass was nothing but flame.

Later, Boyd said, "the manhole covers were popping and they were big manholes, they're not the little ones. So there was a tremendous amount of pressure there."

The NTSB documents also included a two-page policy issued in 2022 by trucking firm Penn Tank Lines Inc. of Chester Springs, Pa., that mandated pre-trip inspections of tanker manhole covers by truck drivers. That policy described the manhole covers as devices that will form a seal in case of a vehicle rollover and noted an incident a vear earlier in which a cover had been left unsecured, "allowing leakage and causing an environmental spill."

Moody, 53, who lived in Willow Grove, Pa., was an owner-operator with a commercial driver license since 2003, investigators said. He leased his truck to TK Transport Inc. of Pennsauken, N.J., which has been a Penn Tank Lines affiliate since 2001. Transport Topics reporters left phone messages seeking comment from TK Transport, Penn Tank Lines and executives with the companies.

The section of I-95 carried about 160,000 vehicles daily before the crash.

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
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

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

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A Likely Story - "Two Words In English"

Recently I made a desperate decision, disguised as an opportunity, to invest in an airport car service. Sort of an Uber on steroids, known in the industry as an executive car service, they provide transport for clients too rich, too big, too old, or too slow for regular taxicabs. It can be economical when you factor in airport parking rates, long-distance ground support, or the risk of getting hit by someone more impatient than you are.

I didn't have much choice, in a way. It was go broke, it seemed, or go home. I discussed it with my wife last week, which all wise men do, and she went for a walk to think about it. I haven't seen her since Wednesday.

In the interest of full disclosure, my girl knows less about investment portfolios than I do, and I know less than the homeless folks on Philadelphia's Kensington Avenue. So when an acquaintance suggested we invest in the car service, I said, why not? This way we can watch the bank account bleed out at pointblank range, instead of a monthly report from our national financial brokerage house.

Rest assured, it's not a dire situation. We can afford to lose, which is

tenet number one for investors, but I'm a good driver and Susan is a great money manager. That meant we were living on rice and beans, even when trucking in six figures, and we certainly don't want to lose our taste for Uncle Ben's now!

As trucking owner-operators, we hauled machinery, which never left a review, and equipment that talked to me only when I was hallucinating. In executive car service, however, we drive the cars, but reviews move the market. In trucking, people waved with one finger occasionally, before driving off in a huff. But in the car service, a bad review never heads down memory lane. Like a skunk in the road, we just have to keep driving around

On paper, there's not a lot of difference between a truck fleet and a car fleet. There are license, maintenance, fuel, insurance, and labor costs, often double what we planned for. These are the issues that keep us from exhaling.

On the other side of that coin, just like trucking, we drive equipment that always gets a second glance and a first-time whistle. Whether it's a parade, airport run, or wedding procession, our rigs always get looks of approval.

Just like trucking, there are bonuses, blessings, gratuities, and opportunities. We often meet movers and shakers, politicians. national outstate celebrities, and even famous Broadway stars I've never heard of. That one required a suit and tie, and they were duly impressed, but my own grandchildren didn't recognize me.

The list of clients we serve includes an Air Force flag officer, a U.S. Attorney General, the local FAA Director, and some guy who had the highest ratings on Fox News. Then there's the lady we've met twice here, who writes canon law for the Catholic Church, and a business owner with a global market for manhole covers.

But my favorite this year is the four Turkish nationals we picked up at the Kansas City Airport, going Kansas. We were told they didn't speak English, so we had to make sure there was no chance for a language foul, especially on a 200mile drive. But they did know two words in English, and it made the whole drive memorable.

From The Chaplain's Desk

Biblical Manhood Part II In the postmodern world, few topics invite as much controversy as discussions of gender. Adding a religious dimension makes the concept even more prone to distortion and emotional reactions. Some of what the Bible says about men and women, how they relate, and what God's expectations are for them may run contrary to our preferences. Those ideas may conflict with our cultures, upbringing, or the opinions of our peers. And yet the definition of biblical manhood (and womanhood) is exactly that: biblical, not opinion-driven.

Biblical Manhood can be boiled down to five basic principles, which each man is expected to conform to. These are 1) humility before his God, 2) control of his appetites, 3) protecting his family, 4) providing for his family, and 5) leading his family. Men who fail to meet these expectations are not behaving as "men," biblically speaking, but as something less noble (Psalm 49:20). Some good examples of biblical manhood in Scripture are Daniel, Caleb, Joshua, Paul, and, of course, Jesus.

Men and women are created in the image of God (Genesis 1:26–27), some-

thing no other creature can claim. This makes every single human being valuable and worthy of respect. And yet males and females are not identical. We are biologically, psychologically, and emotionally distinct. This is not in any sense a bad thing; God called His original creation, which included distinct genders, 'very good" (Genesis 1:31). Biblical manhood must include a godly view of women. Mistreatments of women such as forbidding education, sexual abuse, or denying civil rights are violations of the image-of-God principle. So, too, are attitudes that ignore meaningful differences between the sexes or erase gender roles.

Critically, note those things that Scripture does not include as part of biblical manhood. Men are not called to be tyrants, ruling a home with an iron fist and a dictator's attitude. Nor are they instructed to be cowed and weak-kneed toward their families. Nor are men called on to enforce, in any sense, the biblical ideals of womanhood in their wives. Humility, self-control, protection, provision, and leadership are man's responsibilities and his tools. Men are accountable for spiritual leadership within their families, yet each person is ultimately accountable to God for

his or her own life.

The proper perspective for this leadership comes from Ephesians 5:25-32. The goal of every believer's life is to become more and more like Christ (Romans 8:29). For men in their God-given role, this means leading and loving their wives in the same way Christ loved the church: sacrificially (Ephesians 5:2), through service (John 13:14-15), and in selfless love (Ephesians 5:28). Just as the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit are equal yet serve different roles, so, too can men and women be equal in value and in spiritual worth yet have different roles to play.



Something to Think About - Both Can Be Right

Like most towns in 1933. they were in the grips of the Great Depression. Although well-intended, Roosevelt's New Deal was no quick fix. This recovery was going to take time, effort,

and patience. Neighbors were going to have to help neighbors, and those who had were going to have to help those who didn't. Soup kitchens and breadlines were common sources of aid. There was some

government aid, but by and large it was benevolence that ruled the day.

The soup kitchen set up at the corner of Main Street and Franklin in one small town, was on the first floor of the Garfield State When the bank Bank. failed in early 1931, the board turned the building over to the city, and the city opened it for public use. A soup kitchen was set up in the grand lobby. To say the least, that was an ironic sign of the times. In one building, visitors were reminded of bank failures that contributed to their current situation, while being supported by those trying to make their plight a little easier.

Initially, one of the local churches sponsored the kitchen. As the demand churches other grew, joined in. Fraternal groups, even school groups did what they could to make the place work. It was a community effort started and initially driven by great motives.

The kitchen opened a 6:00 AM and closed at 8:00 PM, but if anyone was waiting before 6:00 or just arriving at 8:00 they were never left to stand or forced to leave. When available, extras were freely given out, and there was never, ever a question about need. If you showed up, it was assumed that you had a need, and everything possible was done

to fulfill it.

the Depression As dragged on, those staffing the kitchen became somewhat divided in how they perceived the effectiveness of their kitchen. Although need was never questioned, it became apparent to some of the staff that they were serving people who really were not in need. These folks simply saw a free meal and decided to indulge themselves. In some cases, it was obvious. And even though they didn't say anything, that situation began to frustrate some of the volunteers. A few quite as a result of what they saw as a failed mission. Some others backed off on both their time commitment and what they were able to donate. They were angered at what they saw happening, and because they could do nothing about it, they grew

In an effort to address the growing frustration among the volunteers. the mayor asked to meet with them shortly after the kitchen closed one particularly cold February evening. There was definitely some consternation in the room. Some folks pointed out that the system was being abused, and that greedy individuals were taking advantage. The mayor knew they were right. In response, others of the group spoke about a greater good, a good that allowed them to serve those who were in need-real need in many cases. The mayor knew they were right too.

increasingly frustrated.

After much discussion,

needed and undeserved advantage of our kitchen, and at the same time we're most definitely serving some seriously needy people every day. And since two things can be right at the same time, we have a choice to make. We can allow some opportunists to weaken or even destroy our kitchen. Or we can focus on those in need, do what we can for them, and accept the reality that no system, no matter how well intended, is perfect. The choice is ours."

The mayor's thoughtful comments stemmed the tide. Oh, there were some who never came back, but he gave those who were committed new energy and a renewed sense of resolve. He also turned the heads of several who were on the verge of giving up on the kitchen. That kitchen remained in continuous operation through the early months of 1942.

In a free and independent nation continually recommitting itself to forming a more perfect union, establishing justice, ensuring domestic tranquility, providing for the common defense, promoting the general welfare, and securing the blessings of liberty, it's essential to always remember that two things can be right at the same time. So before letting your frustrations over something with which you disagree get the better of you, remind yourself of that reality. What you then must do is choose between which one of those rights serves the best interests of those involved, and best represents what you believe to be true about the part you can play in accom-

ATA Applauds Anti-**Predatory Towing Provision** in House Appropriations Bill

Washington, DC... The American Trucking Associations commended the House Appropriations Committee for voting in support of a provision to crack down on predatory towing as part of the fiscal year 2025 transportation funding bill. The bill would direct FMCSA to facilitate discussions with local, state and private sector stakeholders to develop guidelines for towing and recovery regulations at all levels of government.

Predatory towing entails any incident in which a towing operator severely overcharges; illegally seizes assets: damages assets by use of improper equipment; or illegitimately withholds release of a truck, trailer and/or cargo. According to a recent study by the American Transportation Research Institute, the most common types of predatory towing are excessive rates, experienced by 82.7% of motor carriers, and unwarranted extra service charges. experienced by 81.8% of carriers. A majority of carriers encountered additional issues such as truck release or access delays, cargo release delays, truck seizure without cause and tows misreported as consensual.

The report language on predatory towing was released after the House Appropriations Committee voted 31-26 to advance the bill to the House floor. Last month, ATA applauded a number of other victories for trucking that were folded into the legislation, including \$200 million to expand truck parking.
